As you know, our state parks already operate on a shoe string budget. Years of underfunding have caused many of our state parks to fall into disrepair. Although current Parks Commissioner Ash has done an admirable job restoring some of their past grandeur, many people still question why the state continues to neglect its finest assets, its own state parks.

Closing our parks penalizes our residents for years of wasteful spending on so many other fronts. With limited funding, the Office of State Parks continues to carry out its mission, which includes providing a safe and enjoyable recreational opportunity for all New York State residents. You must not allow this mission to fail. We cannot afford to deprive the people of this state use of its public lands.

The Nissequogue River State Park Foundation, which is dedicated to helping the state enhance and beautify the NRSP, hopes you will reconsider closing any one of our state parks. They contribute greatly to our quality of life and remind us everyday why we call New York our home. As our Governor, we expect that you will hear our voices and respond to our pleas to keep our parks open for the joy and pride they offer our residents each and every day.
